OXFORD HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Founded in 1884, the Society publishes editions of historical records relating to the City, University and Colleges of Oxford. To date 133 volumes have been issued, of which almost 100 are still in print. Works available from the Society include Messrs. Cordeaux and Merry's bibliographies of the City of Oxford (1976), Oxfordshire (1950), and a supplementary volume on Oxfordshire (1981). The Society's latest publication is *Domestic Accounts of Merton College, 1482-94*, edited by J.M. Fletcher and C.A. Upton.

Members receive a new hardback volume every two years, an annual Newsletter, and the opportunity to purchase previous publications at a generous discount on retail prices.
